The year is coming to an end but my commitment to advocate for the programs and services most important to my constituents continues. The Committee on Public Health held its final hearing of the year and remains hard at work on important bills. Important legislation has been addressed in the State House and I am actively engaged. See the "Public Health Update" and the "Legislative Update" below for more details.

In the district, community meetings and its members have been actively engaged on a number of important issues. Enhancement projects for the Arborway, Jamaicaaway, and Centre Street are underway and a meeting to discuss final plans will be held in January. Access to wireless internet (Wi-Fi) in Jamaica Plain has been an ongoing project and potential sponsors are being considered. Additionally, I am honored to have participated in the ribbon-cutting ceremony that celebrated the completion of the Creighton Commons Condominiums and the re-start of construction on Building M, both on the campus of the former Blessed Sacrament Church in Hyde Square Jamaica Plain. Building M will have thirty-six units, retail space on the first floor, and an underground parking garage extending from Creighton Commons. It is scheduled to be completed in October 2010.

As the holiday season begins, community meetings continue and holiday gatherings will be occurring in the district. Check out "Community Events and Happenings" for specific events in the district. I encourage you to attend and look forward to seeing you around the district.

As I mentioned in the previous newsletter, I encourage everyone to participate in the March 2010 Census. The Census is a confidential survey protected by law that reflects the number of people living in the state. Census information helps states receive and allocate funds to locations in need of improvement. Residents of all ages, races, ethnic groups, citizens, and non-citizens are included and vital to the count. Thus, it is important that everyone in the district participate. LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

After years of intense work from advocates and legislators alike, "An Act to Preserve Affordable Housing" was signed into law. We are currently reviewing bills relative to Education and CORI (Criminal Offender Record Information). These bills were engrossed by the Senate and will come before the House in January 2010.

As a long-time advocate for affordable housing, I have been particularly concerned with expiring use. I have vigorously worked for years on a bill to preserve affordable housing and protect vulnerable populations living in publicly assisted housing. The law aims to preserve affordability of 90,000 government-assisted housing units in the Commonwealth, many of which are occupied by senior citizens and individuals with disabilities and are at risk of being converted to market rates. I also filed an amendment to extend the opportunity for the development of affordable housing through low-income housing tax credits that was included in the final version of the bill and specifically helps Mission Hill's Pickle-Ditson project, now named Oliver Lofts. Oliver Lofts, the site of a former pickle factory and the former Oliver Dickson music publishing building, has been vacant since the 1980s and suffers from deferred maintenance, decay, and vandalism. The project will be renovated into "green" apartments.

As many of you know, CORI is how the Commonwealth records all criminal cases an individual has acquired in state courts, regardless of the final charge. CORI reports enable employers, public housing officials, school administrators, and others to screen out potentially dangerous ex-offenders. However, this creates a major barrier for people with criminal records who may not be a threat to society. Proposed CORI Reform would shorten the wait time for sealing criminal records, simplify the sealing process, and mandate aspects of the hiring process. CORI Reform would provide employment opportunities for ex-offenders currently shut out of jobs. I am actively involved with other legislators to create the best bill on CORI Reform to boost employment while also protecting public safety.

We have been actively engaged on bills relative to education, including legislation concerning charter schools and improving the quality of education in the most underperforming schools in the Commonwealth. I understand the issues our schools face and am committed to establishing quality education systems with standards and adequate support services for all students in the Commonwealth. I will continue to work thoroughly on this legislation as it moves through the legislature and am determined to further advocate for the most underserved populations in our schools. This bill is particularly challenging since the administration is seeking federal "Race to the Top" funds. At the crux of the bill is language that expands the charter school cap. There is also language that seeks to address challenges in underperforming schools. While the "Race to the Top" dollars are a great incentive for innovation, I am trying to learn more about what happens to school districts once the dollars have been spent and if there are specific standards to how school districts will improve the quality of education of English Language Learners throughout the Commonwealth. These are just a couple of the questions I will be seeking answers for in this month and January before we vote on a House bill. I have received numerous emails and calls from so many people on different aspects of this bill. I welcome any further insight you may have that will contribute to my decision making. I myself am a product of the Boston Public Schools. I am extremely concerned that the achievement gap persists as well as the extremely high dropout rates. I will continue to work with my colleagues on a bill that seeks to address these challenges for all students.

FROM THE JOINT COMMITTEE ON PUBLIC HEALTH

The Joint Committee on Public Health continues its important work throughout the holiday season. Last month we held three public hearings on 55 pieces of legislation with topics including the health care workforce, prescription drug costs, health insurance requirements and local boards of health. This month we will continue researching and working on the nearly 350 bills before us. Recently, we have had the pleasure of working with numerous HIV/AIDS advocates, including AIDS Action Committee, to improve the access to and quality of HIV testing in the Commonwealth. This work is especially appropriate given that December 1st was World AIDS day. Did you know that the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) estimated that over 20% of people living with HIV aren't aware of their status and that nearly 40% are diagnosed late?

The committee is also actively working with the Massachusetts Public Health Association, the Massachusetts Health Council and Children's Hospital to improve access to healthy food choices in schools. Fruits and vegetables are especially important as we enter into the winter season. The flu spreads very easily, so always remember to wash your hands and cover your mouth with a tissue or your elbow when coughing or sneezing. If you are interested in receiving an H1N1 vaccination, the Boston Public Health Commission will be hosting free clinics at Hyde Park High School on Saturday, December 5th and the William Ohrenberger School in West Roxbury on Sunday, December 6th. Both clinics will take place from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. and will be targeting high-risk Boston residents between the ages of 3 and 64. More information can be found at www.bphc.com/org.
