



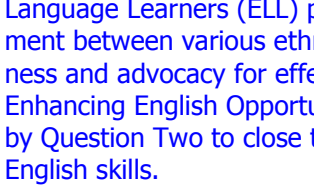
Dear Friend,

LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

This past month was eventful in the State House. Proposed significant legislation, such as English Language Learners Programs in schools, Language Restrictions in the Workplace, Affordable Housing, and Safer Alternatives to Toxic Chemicals in the Workplace, have been before the legislature.

Many devoted educators and administrators from around the Commonwealth attended a briefing on enhancing English Language Learners (ELL) programs for all students. At the meeting, participants discussed gaps in academic achievement between various ethnic groups and their English speaking counterparts. In addition, the need to increase awareness and advocacy for effective ELL programs in schools was addressed. As lead sponsor of H.486, "An Act relative to Enhancing English Opportunities for all Students in the Commonwealth," I am working to replace the system put in place by Question Two to close the achievement gap for Massachusetts students, regardless of language barriers or lack of English skills.

Also in regard to foreign languages, a hearing was held on H.1851, "An Act Opposing Unnecessary Language Restrictions in the Workplace," of which I am the lead sponsor. This legislation would make it generally illegal for employers to use workplace language restrictions like "English Only" rules. It would allow employees the freedom to use the language of their choice at the workplace. An employer could still implement restrictions, provided it does not affect the efficient operation of the business. This bill would prevent employees from being dismissed for simply speaking their native language in the workplace.

Just last week, we in the House successfully passed H.4298, "An Act Preserving Publicly-Assisted Affordable Housing," legislation that seeks to preserve affordable housing and protect tenants living in more than 24,000 publicly-assisted affordable homes. I also successfully amended H.2779, "An Act Clarifying the Use of Certain State Tax Credits." The amendment extends the opportunity for investments and tax credits, which would provide more affordable housing in the Commonwealth. It affects Terrace Street Lofts, also known as the Pickle-Ditson project in Mission Hill, the site of a former pickle factory and the former Oliver Ditson music publishing building, as well as Pond View in Gloucester and Re-treat at Union Pond in Wareham.

Most recently heard in the State House was H.757, "An Act for a Competitive Economy through Safer Alternatives to Toxic Chemicals," of which I am a co-sponsor. This legislation seeks to create a comprehensive program to replace toxic chemicals with safer alternatives in consumer products and other businesses. It would protect public health from adverse health impacts and develop opportunities to strengthen the competitiveness and growth of Massachusetts businesses.

FROM THE JOINT COMMITTEE ON PUBLIC HEALTH

The Public Health Committee has been busy the past month! We held four public hearings on over 70 bills relative to vital records and funeral services, health insurance and financing, the healthcare workforce, infectious disease privacy and testing, as well as medical sharps. We will wrap up our hearing schedule in the upcoming weeks. On November 10th, we will hear testimony concerning state health program financing, cost control of pharmaceutical benefits, and mandated benefits. Our last scheduled hearing of the year will take place on November 17th regarding legislation that examines a municipal public health authority, regional public health, and emergency medical services. As always, we encourage your input relative to the legislation on our docket. The Public Health Committee accepts oral or written testimony at any time prior to an executive session.
